





I am of the opinion that my life belongs to the whole community and as long as I live, it is my privilege to do for it whatever I can. I want to be thoroughly used up

when I die, for the harder I work the more I live. Or, put another way, Service is the rent we pay for our room here on earth.



The CRCFL has been an amazing resource throughout my cancer journey and I'm happy to help advance their mission as a board member. They

always have time to answer questions, share a resource, tote bag or head covering, and always takes the extra step to make you feel important and that you matter. They also remind you to celebrate the victories-no matter how small-while also lending a kind ear or gentle shoulder for the challenging days.



I had a Whipple for a pancreatic tumor at CMC in 1994 and spent a month in ICUI and 4 North. I want to "give back" in retirement to be of service

to the people who come after me, both cancer survivors and medical providers as well. I celebrate being alive by being of service to others.



My best friend was diagnosed with brain cancer at 30 and I witnessed the important work of the Cancer Resource Center through her eyes. The

CRC's outreach and support groups were such a critical part of Emily's experience that she became a volunteer herself. Five years after her death, I am proud that I can carry on her legacy and give back to our community in her spirit.



I learned first-hand how CRC provides support and connection for those going through a cancer experience, when I was diagnosed with Breast Can-

cer in 2004. My family and close friends benefitted as well. I serve on the Board because I want to help ensure that CRC is here to help others in our community, so that "no one faces cancer alone."



My why is because of having family who have had cancer and have recovered and others who have died from their cancer. I believe that it is important for

people not to face cancer alone.



Since starting at Ithaca College 8 years ago, I found CRC to be a wonderfully supportive community partner. Collaboration has included

CRC helping to recruit participants for on-campus research projects that provided individualized exercise programs to local community members in the home and on-campus fitness settings. Additionally, together we were able to engage IC students with the organization as support persons, volunteers at the Walkathon, and presenters at support groups, Living Well With Cancer series, and the Cornell monthly lecture series. This organization is an invaluable resource to our community members and facilitating student connections can provide great opportunities for all involved.



CRC supports me on my cancer journey, and I have characterized that support to others this way; my support group was like receiving a warm blanket on the

coldest day of the year.



After 18 years of a finance professional career in for-profit companies in New York City, I had the chance to fulfill my desire of working in non-prof-

it organizations in Ithaca. Since then I worked in a few and tried my best to serve in many to support the Ithaca community. With its noble mission, diversity of programs, and inclusive approach, CRC is an organization I am honored to serve and would like to be part and supporter of for many years.



My interest in the CRC is related to my father's long battle with prostrate cancer. I remember many doctor's appointments, treatments, medications, etc. ulured over three decades

that my dad endured over three decades. And the possibility that I too could face.



Currently I support the Cancer Resource Center by serving as a member of its board of directors, volunteering in various capacities, and financial

giving. The reason I do this is because I believe this: "The mission of the Cancer Resource Center of the Finger Lakes is to create and sustain a community of support for people living with and affected by cancer." Cancer is a terrifying and lonely word for anyone to hear, but the Cancer Resource Center does the good work every day to ensure it does not have to
